## Understanding the Statement of Results

Your Statement of Results gives you two main pieces of information:

### 1 Overall score

This is your overall Cambridge English Scale score for the whole exam. It is the most important piece of information. It is the average of the individual scores that you receive for the three exam papers. The Reading and Writing paper tests two skills, so the score is doubled. The overall score is calculated by adding all of the individual scores together, and dividing by four.

### 2 Individual scores

You will be given a Cambridge English Scale score for each of the three exam papers (Reading and Writing, Listening and Speaking). With these individual scores it is easy for you to see how you performed across the exam and if you need to improve in any of the skills.

You will also receive a CEFR level and a grade for the overall exam. These are also shown on the Statement of Results.

## Certificate


As well as a Statement of Results, everyone who achieves a score of 120–150 will receive the Key English Test Certificate. If you score between 100 and 119, you will receive a Cambridge English certificate stating that you demonstrated ability at CEFR Level A1.

The certificate will show your overall score on the scale, individual scores for each paper, CEFR level and grade.



The Key English Test (KET) is an examination targeted at Level A2 in the Council of Europe's Common European Framework of Reference.

Candidates achieving Pass with Distinction (between 140 and 150 on the Cambridge English Scale) receive the Key English Test certificate stating that they have demonstrated ability at Level B1. Candidates achieving Pass with Merit or Pass (between 120 and 139 on the Cambridge English Scale) receive the Key English Test certificate at Level A2.

Candidates whose performance is below Level A2, but falls within Level A1 (between 100 and 119 on the Cambridge English Scale), receive a Cambridge English certificate stating that they have demonstrated ability at Level A1.
